Nicole Sheppard and the "Follow Me 2 Forty" Movement

A Licensed Professional Counselor and a High School Counselor, Nicole has years of experience and exposure in helping people better themselves.

With a husband and 3 children of her own, Nicole not only enjoys an active life, but she often finds herself looking for another opportunity to encourage or help someone else.

In June 2013, she started "Follow Me 2 Forty" non-profit work because she wanted to find a way to give back to her community each month. Since then, Nicole and her children and other charity lovers have gone to parks to pick up trash, participated in the Komen Race, and organized and gave away canned goods to the needy with Mission Arlington.

"One of the first places we went to was a senior assisted living home and painted the nails of the elderly as well as had a party with them.", Nicole says. "It was a fun experience, especially for my children who had never spent time with a group

of elderly women doing something for them in that manner. We met a woman who was 100 years old and full of life!"

When asked what makes her non-profit work unique in comparison others who are doing something similar, Nicole shared that it vision is a monthly outreach that helps women and children and anyone can get involved. Volunteers don't have to be a certain age or gender. She posts on social media outlets like Facebook and Instagram to get friends to join her and meet her out in the community to help others. It's random, spontaneous and fun!

The feedback from people who have been following the Follow Me 2 Forty movement has been tremendous. Many see Nicole as a woman with a desire to help many people through giving and being a positive asset to the community in which she lives. She won't stop until lives have been touched and impacted in such a way that it allows others to feel Christian love through her and her children's acts of service as well as her friends.

One of her most memorable community events that Nicole holds near and dear to her heart is the Habitat For Humanity house project in 2014 in which she and her volunteers helped build a house for a family in Fort Worth, Texas. "It brought joy to my heart to know that I was a small contributor to the future happy home to a family by helping put nails in the walls of the home and by sawing wood. It was a new experience for me but one that I tackled in order to be a blessing to a family I didn't know and probably will never meet." says Nicole.

Nicole has been featured in blogs and articles about her non-profit, including Lifetime Fitness gym's web page. Her story and journey continues to expand. She has even inspired many to start their own nonprofits, one of which was her personal trainer who started a "Follow Me 2 Sixty" journey.

Elizabeth Navarette-Savage takes a S.T.A.N.D.



Born in El Paso, TX, Elizabeth is a wife, mother, grandmother, and sister to many. She is founder of S.T.A.N.D Organization (Stand Together Against Nationwide Domestic-Violence) located in the city of Arlington, Texas.

S.T.A.N.D. consists of 6 Board Members, 7 members, and 30+ volunteers.

A survivor of domestic violence herself, Elizabeth knows what it means to experience an abusive spouse and to suffer great loss. In 1995, she lost 3 of her children in a house fire. "God kept me and now my heart is to help others." Elizabeth says.

There was a time when domestic violence was a man on a woman but now it has changed where both are being abused. As a result, S.T.A.N.D. offers help to both women and men along with children. They also have a program that focuses on the abuser.

S.T.A.N.D. has hosted a 5k/10k for the past two years in honor of victims of domestic violence. They partner with several shelters in various cities as well as volunteer with the City of Arlington Police Department to help take care of the city.

A licensed minister and motivational speaker, June Evans has experienced her share of challenges at a young age. Married at 18 and divorced at 22, she wanted to influence change in the lives of teenagers. This brought about the Treasured Ladies Club which June founded in 1999 in Waco, TX. Currently in 4 districts and servicing 150 girls, June's goal is to cover 8 districts and service 500 girls.

Motherhood and a firm suggestion from her children was the motivation that catapulted her into her dream.

What makes Treasured Ladies Club so unique is the focus of socializing and encouraging high school girls.

June uses every platform afforded to her such as schools, colleges, youth camp, youth organizations, and sororities. Organizations such as Girls, Inc. and Girl Scouts have been impacted by Junes' efforts.

As if that wasn't exciting enough, Treasured Ladies Club has a 100% high school graduation rate, 95% college attendance rate, and zero pregnancies.

June's organization is comprised of an assistant (a former Treasured Lady herself) and various volunteers who help on occasion. She hopes to get more permanent team members to partner with her to reach a bigger audience.

In addition to the Treasured Ladies Club, June also hosts an HIV/AIDS 5k/Walk each December to raise awareness.

A graduate of Jackson State University, and currently Asst. Director of Community Engagement at UTDallas, understands the importance of education, especially that of African American males.

While working for Dallas County Community College District (DCCCD) office, David was exposed to underrepresented male populations. He saw the need to establish an event that would be educational and exciting for young men wanting to exceed in the classroom. Hence, the African American Male Academic

Bowl made it's place in the community as an annual event beginning in 2009.

In an interview with CW33 News, David states "They study for months at a time. Once they get here they know that if they don't advance after that first round... that's it!"

Averaging 70 – 100 volunteer sign-ins annually, AAMAB continues to receive support from major organizations such as McDonalds, UT-Dallas, DCCCD, Sen. Royce West, AT&T. Young Scholars also partners with and supports the Project Still I Rise, Inc. organization (www.PSIR. org).

Although finding male mentors to help is one of his biggest challenges, David remains passionate about seeing young men succeed academically.

One God Nation would like to give a shout out to Darlene Lewis of Lewis-Barnett Employment Finders, Inc. for her superior service to an often neglected population, ex-prisoners.

In Little Rock, Ark., Darlene has given thousands of former inmates a second chance to contribute to society, local station THV11 reports.

For the past three decades, Darlene Lewis's nonprofit organization has helped ex-offenders prepare for interviews, assisted with job placement and provided help with resume writing and GED prep — all at no cost.

Last year alone, the nonprofit aided 2,000 men and women find full-time jobs, reports say. The organization also helps with housing and advocates for offenders in court.

Lewis started her nonprofit in 1987 for very personal reasons. "I had a son go to prison many years ago and when he got out of prison it was so difficult for him to get a job," she tells the station.



One God Nation would also like to give a shout out to Faye Gaines for her unwavering efforts in her community.

In a small town in Arkansas, there lives an extraordinary woman named Faye Gaines whom the City of Marianna knows quite well. She loves music, going for power walks, and preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ.

What makes Faye so unique is that although she has some physical handicaps, she is making a huge difference in people's lives in her local community...and she does it all vision-impaired and partially deaf.

Faye, who just recently received her ministerial license in November 2014, has managed to organize several events on an annual basis over many years such as the Resurrection Seed Campaign (an annual church project fundraiser), Spiritual Operation Give Up (a school supply drive), Hands of The Harvest (elderly services support for free fans), and the Canned Goods & Clothing Drive (collected items go to local churches to aid their members in need).

When she was a teenager, Faye was sent to school for the blind to get an education. Because she didn't understand why she was separated from her siblings, she felt aliented. As she got older, she wanted to be the voice for others who had disabilities to let the world know that they want to be accepted and included. Her message is "Don't look at my disability, look at my dream."
